Priority I. Access to Care

Access

Baptist Medical Center Jacksonville (Baptist Jacksonville), building on the 2019 Community Health Needs Assessment, continued to address healthcare gaps through a variety of channels by collaborating with local free clinics, federally qualified health centers, and community-based organizations. The hospital aimed to address the needs of the most atrisk populations including uninsured and underinsured Duval residents and the medically underserved.

Goal:

Increase access to health services for uninsured and underinsured people in the Baptist Medical Center Jacksonville service area.

Strategies:

- Continue partnering with organizations that provide access to care for Duval residents who do not have health insurance.
- Support JaxCareConnect in collaborative efforts to increase access to care, access to interpretive services, and marketing and awareness of services.
- Continue partnering with organizations to provide referrals for and increase access to smoking cessation classes and assistive medication.
- Continue providing screenings and health coaching through Healthy Living Centers and Jewish Community Association (JCA) Health Connexion.

Safety Net Clinics

About 1 in 9 Duval County residents were uninsured as of the 2020 Census. Baptist Jacksonville collaborated with WeCare and the local safety net clinics of Community Health Outreach, Muslim American Social Services, Sulzbacher Downtown, and Volunteers in Medicine to address the needs of uninsured and underinsured residents. Along with a deficit in mental health services in the area, developing a source of health care for residents has become increasingly important. Baptist Health, thus, continued the development of partners and community resources. Some measures of care from fiscal years 2022-2024 (October-September) are highlighted below.

JaxCareConnect

JaxCareConnect is a collaboration created by the local nonprofit safety net of free and charitable clinics to assist uninsured adult Duval County residents find a primary care medical home. In addition to establishing primary care, they evaluate the whole person and explore other barriers to healthcare to support best possible health outcomes. The aim is to better inform uninsured patients about their healthcare options so that all Duval County residents have access to comprehensive primary care – regardless of insurance status or ability to pay. From FY 2022-2024 there was a 121.4% increase in referrals for care received with over half of the referrals during this time being moved forward successfully for eligible uninsured Duval County residents.

Area Health Education Center

The Florida Area Health Education Centers (AHEC) program had two types of groups to help participants quit using tobacco: single session (meeting once) and multi-session (meeting once a week for several weeks). They provided participants with valuable tools that included: preparing to become tobaccofree with a quit plan; learning strategies and skills to

deal with nicotine cravings to remain tobacco-free; dealing with slips; and having the opportunity to share experiences with others in a friendly, respectful and supportive group setting. Baptist Health utilized this partnership to address needs it wasn't fully equipped to tackle. Of the 170 patients referred from fiscal years 2022-2024, 28 (23.1%) participated in and completed the course.

Baptist Health Partnerships

The Healthy Living Centers and Jewish Community Alliance brought health and wellness programs from Baptist Health into Northeast Florida communities. A variety of programs led by medical professionals included health risk assessments, disease prevention, classes and events, health coaching, and health care navigation. From FY 2022-2024, the number of lives served increased by 17.0% to 6,720 lives.

Education

Baptist Jacksonville provided community education through the Community Health and Well-Being Department and Health Partnerships with the aim of improving prevention and healthy behaviors by making healthcare information and professionals accessible.

Goal:

Increase knowledge of chronic diseases and where to access services.

Strategies:

- Provide education and prevention programming in the community.
- Implement a falls prevention program initiative for Duval seniors.

Health Education

Baptist Health's Community Health and Well-Being Department provided free educational webinars multiple times a year to community members on health topics that included: cognition and dementia, colorectal cancer, diabetes, heart health, mental health, nutrition, and stroke awareness. There were 449 non-unique attendants throughout FY 2022-2023.

95.6% agreed or strongly agreed that the webinars delivered the information they expected to receive.

91.7% agreed or strongly agreed that because of the webinar, they gained new knowledge that will help them with their well-being.

93.8% agreed or strongly agreed that they plan to apply what they learned.

Baptist Health Partnerships

The Healthy Living Centers and Jewish Community Alliance brought health and wellness programs from Baptist Health into Northeast Florida communities. A variety of programs led by medical professionals included physician chats ("Talk with a Doc"), women's health education, prevention & wellness, and support groups. Across these subjects, 1,092 educational programs were offered during FY 2022-2024.

Falls Prevention

Falls are a leading cause of injury-related deaths in Florida, and to increase awareness, Baptist Health continued to provide educational opportunities to improve the health of seniors. Two webinar sessions were offered which entailed the play *Denying Gravity* followed by a panel discussion and a presentation on arthritis. Forty-five participants were present from FY 2022-2023. The death rates from falls by county are presented below.

Priority II. Mental and Behavioral Health

Baptist Health has made behavioral health services a priority by providing comprehensive inpatient and outpatient services to both children and adults. Mental health was a priority health need addressed by Baptist Jacksonville in the 2019 CHNA, and the focus on this continued in the 2022 CHNA as the behavioral health needs of Jacksonville residents increased.

Goal:

A healthy community with easy and timely access to high quality mental and behavioral healthcare services when needed.

Strategies:

- Continue offering Mental Health First Aid, a proven best practice to reduce stigma of mental illness which increases the likelihood that people will access care.
- Convene a leadership task force of providers, elected leaders, and people with lived experience to prioritize identified opportunities and develop a plan for action.
- Host community-wide conferences on mental health to reduce stigma and barriers to care.
- Participate in Project Save Lives to provide access to peer support for ED patients with mental health and substance use disorders for the purpose of getting them into treatment.
- Implement support groups for LGBT+ populations to address addictions, mental health, advocacy, community resources, etc.
- Provide education and prevention programming in the community.

Health Education Series

Baptist Health's Community Health and Well-Being Department provided free educational webinars multiple times to community members on health topics that included: cognition and dementia, coping with grief, and mental health. There were 108 non-unique attendants throughout FY 2022-2023.

- 93.5% agreed or strongly agreed that the webinars delivered the information they expected to receive.
- **89.1%** agreed or strongly agreed that because of the webinar, they gained new knowledge that will help them with their well-being.
- **91.3%** agreed or strongly agreed that they plan to apply what they learned.

JASMYN

JASMYN supports the empowerment of LGBTQ+ teens and young adults through leadership, advocacy, resources, and a safe and affirming community. Through the Mental Health Enhancement Program (MHEP), JASMYN aimed to improve and advance the mental health well-being of LGBTQ+ young people, ages 13-29, by addressing social isolation and anxiety, mental health stigma, racial and LGBT bias, and other stressors in therapeutic sessions. From FY 2023-2024 the program provided 141 support group sessions for 468 teens of which over 60% were uninsured.

Leadership Task Force

Through collaboration between Baptist Health, Hope Street, Kids Hope Alliance, and The Partnership for Child Health, Hope & Healing JAX was created in FY 2022 to lead systemic change throughout Jacksonville for a healing centered care movement with a more comprehensive and collaborative organization of resources. The city-wide initiative aimed to address the following:

- 1) foster awareness and culture change
- 2) prevent and reduce adverse childhood experiences and trauma
- 3) nurture learning committees.

Through this work, Hope & Healing JAX delivered Trust-Based Relational Intervention® (TBRI) training to parents, caregivers, teachers, faith leaders, and service providers across the sector from FY 2023-2024. As the Building Trauma Response Jacksonville lead agency, Hope & Healing JAX networked to strengthen existing healing and resilience building efforts while addressing Positive & Adverse Childhood Experiences (PACEs).

Two Action Group Retreat events were held at Baptist Medical Center Jacksonville in FY 2023 to strengthen and grow existing trauma-informed care efforts with local organizations. Also, TBRI practitioners at Baptist Health and Wolfson Children's Hospital led 21 staff trainings resulting in 564 team members trained in TBRI from FY 2023-2024.

Mental Health First Aid

Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) is an evidence-based, early-intervention course that taught participants to identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental illnesses and substance use disorders. The training provided them with the needed skills to reach out and provide initial help and support to someone who may be developing a mental health or substance use problem or experiencing a crisis. Through Starting Point Behavioral Health and THE PLAYERS Center for Child Health, Baptist Health continued to support trainings across Clay, Duval, Nassau, and St. Johns counties.

Mental Health Conference: Access and Advocacy

Access and Advocacy: A Community Conversation was held on April 27, 2022, and included a keynote presentation from Andy Keller, Ph.D., a panel discussion, and a call to action. Dr. Keller, President and Chief Executive Officer of The Meadows Mental Health Policy Institute in Dallas, TX, reviewed current models of care, mental health advocacy opportunities to improve access and quality, and the importance of evidence-based care in behavioral health. Dr. Keller then moderated the panel discussion that included Aaron Bean, President Pro Tempore, Florida Senate, District 4; Nick Dewman, M.D., Vice President, Behavioral Health, Florida Blue; Terrance Freeman, Council Vice President, Jacksonville City Council At-Large Group 1; and Cheryl Love, Chief Clinical and Patient Safety Officer, Florida Hospital Association.

191 registrants were in attendance.

100% of survey respondents (34) rated the conference quality as excellent or good.

Project Save Lives

Project Save Lives aimed to establish a program that provided specialized, coordinated, and seamless services for the treatment of drug addiction and substance misuse, thereby reducing dependence on drugs and alcohol and reducing drug-related deaths. When overdose patients arrived at a participating hospital emergency department (ED), lifesaving stabilization was the priority. Once stabilized, patients were met by a Peer Specialist who was housed in the ED. The Peer Specialist established a rapport with the patient and worked as part of the multidisciplinary healthcare team to aid in the early recognition and treatment of withdrawal symptoms. Patients were also offered recovery services as appropriate, and those who elected to participate were provided transportation directly to Gateway Community Center or another local provider. Patients who refused services were closely followed by a peer and were offered Nasal NARCAN®. The continued follow up and connection encouraged patients to enter treatment later.

Seniors

In addition to access to care, Baptist Jacksonville aimed to address seniors' mental health needs. Because of the effects of COVID-19 on this population, addressing isolation had been identified as strategy.

Goal:

Decrease isolation of seniors.

Strategy:

Develop phone friendships between seniors through a Friendly Callers program.

Friendly Caller Program

The Friendly Caller Program was established in 2020 during the height of COVID-19. While its purpose was to lessen the impacts of isolation for seniors during social distancing, it illuminated a persistent need for connection and community.

Priority III. Maternal and Child Health

Maternal and Child Health

Baptist Jacksonville committed to addressing the health of women during pregnancy, childbirth, and the postnatal period. Each stage should be a positive experience, ensuring women and their babies reach their full potential for health and well-being.

Goal:

Zero preventable deaths. Zero health disparities.

Strategies:

- Partner with the Northeast Florida Healthy Start Coalition to address needs of mothers and babies.
- Expand WELLcome Home initiative to Baptist South in 2023
- Offer classes focused on increasing awareness of safe sleep practices.
- Continue partnering with Duval County Public Schools to provide safe sex education through health curriculum.

Duval County Public Schools

THE PLAYERS Center for Child Health provided safe sex education with Duval County Public Schools. Team members assisted with condom demonstrations for 962 students in 24 school classes during FY 2022-2023.

Northeast Florida Healthy Start Coalition

The Northeast Florida Healthy Start Coalition, Inc. was organized in 1991 as part of a statewide network of community-based organizations to reduce Florida's high infant mortality and improve the lives of pregnant women and their families. To achieve this, as part of a Fetal Infant Mortality Review action plan, Healthy Start utilized community health workers (CHWs) in the targeted zip codes of 32209 and 32210 in Duval County.

From FY 2023-2024, the Healthy Start Coalition also provided 432 educational classes and opportunities on toxic stress to 1,121 providers and 362 educational opportunities on maternal health to 1,066 families. To assess mothers' needs and connect them to resources, a family partner also conducted a social determinant of health system of care screening with 931 mothers at St. Vincent Riverside and Life Tree Women's Clinic.

THE PLAYERS Center for Child Health

THE PLAYERS Center for Child Health at Wolfson Children's, through Safe Kids Northeast Florida programs such as "First Year Baby Safety Essentials," helped mothers keep infants safe and secure during their first months. The programs taught the basics of safe sleep, CPR and choking procedures for infants, first aid, unintentional injury prevention, and other important baby care information for new mothers.

WELLcome Home

WELLcome Home is a maternal and newborn program that provided all mothers who resided in Jacksonville, FL a complimentary follow-up call from a Baptist Health nurse within 3-5 days of their hospital discharge to check in on mother and infant at no-cost. A nurse supported the mother with any post-discharge care recovery; referred the mother to any additional resources, services, and/or follow-up appointments (ex: Baptist Health Maternal Mental Health); and provided all mothers with infant safe sleep, feeding support and education, home and car safety educational reminders, and tips and warning signs for both mother and baby. The program began at Baptist Jacksonville in February 2020 before expanding to Baptist Beaches in March 2022, Baptist Clay in August 2023, and Baptist South in August 2023. Outreach efforts also expanded to include families with fetal demise or infants discharged from the NICU.

Perinatal Mood Disorders

Maternal mental health conditions are the most common complications of pregnancy, childbirth, and the postpartum period. Baptist Health deployed multiple efforts to support pregnant and new mothers with perinatal mood and anxiety disorders (PMADs), often referred to as postpartum depression.

Goal:

Support parents with perinatal mood disorders.

Strategies:

- Provide a continuum of care including psychology and psychiatry support on an inpatient and outpatient basis.
- Provide education on perinatal mood disorder (PMD) to clinicians.
- Provide support groups to new mothers experiencing PMD.

Baptist Maternal Mental Health

Baptist Maternal Mental Health trained staff about perinatal mental health to better ascertain and support mothers with PMADs. From FY 2022-2024, 575+ clinicians and frontline providers were educated on perinatal mental health.

Also in the fall of 2023, Baptist Health opened a new day program, The Motherhood Space, to further support pregnant mothers. The program was led by a team of 5 clinicians who specialized in perinatal mental health and provided individual and group therapeutic treatment at the day program. From FY 2023-2024, 119 mothers participated.

Other supports included the New Moms Support Group which provided a space for new mothers to discuss their experiences with other mothers. From FY 2022-2024, 239 mothers participated. In addition, the Motherhood Space Video Series was offered as a virtual educational option for mothers who may have been unable to immediately access any of The Motherhood Space Program's offerings. By FY 2024, there were 90,000+ views and 291 subscribers, compared to 45 participants who were able to attend PMAD lectures during FY22.

Vision

Public schools currently conduct vision screenings in grades K, 1, 3, and 6. Based on data from Vision is Priceless, approximately 20% of students failed a vision screening, and in low-income schools, 78% of the students failed a vision screening two consecutive years. This indicated they did not receive a vision exam and glasses, if needed. Baptist Jacksonville aimed to address this need for its students in Duval County.

Goal:

All children can see.

Strategies:

Provide access to screenings, exams, and glasses for children in need.

Vision is Priceless

Vision is Priceless worked to assess, sustain, and improve the visual health of children and adults in Northeast Florida through education, vision screenings, treatment, and referrals. It was founded to fulfill the need for vision screenings and to provide access to vision care, including eye exams, prescription glasses, and specialty care, for the uninsured and underserved.

Priority IV. Social Determinants of Health

While the traditional role of health care is to treat patients' physical symptoms and medical conditions, clinical care accounts for only about 20 percent of an individual's health outcomes. An individual's habits and behaviors account for about 30 percent of that person's quality and length of life. The social, economic, and environmental factors, also known as the social determinants of health (SDOH) determine 50% of an individual's health outcomes, and they affect an individual's ability to stay healthy and recover from illness, manage chronic conditions, and maintain overall well-being.

Goal:

Address social needs that prevent people from achieving optimal health.

Strategies:

- Increase employment opportunities.
- Increase access to healthy food.
- Ensure parks are safe places for children and adults.
- Ensure seniors have access to in-home and other supports for health and wellbeing including foods.
- Research opportunities to address housing and transportation.
- ❖ Implement Findhelp (Aunt Bertha) referral system for patients and community members.

Employment Opportunities

Baptist Health, through the Healthcare Anchor Network and local organizations like Lift Jax, worked on strategies to connect residents of economically disadvantaged neighborhoods to quality jobs and career pathways. Through outside-in hiring pipelines, individuals with barriers to employment would have specific entry points for high-demand jobs through training and skills development.

From FY 2023-2024, Baptist Health hired a total of 1,088 individuals from the zip codes of 32206, 32208, 32209, 32210, and 32244, which have some of the lowest life expectancies in northeast Florida. This represented above 12% of all new hires.

Training programs, such as the Certified Nursing Assistant Training Program at the Baptist Health Clinical School, also offered opportunities for residents to enter the healthcare field. From FY 2023-2024, the program saw five cohorts with 77 community participants completing the program, of which 52 new CNAs were hired.

Last, through Lift Jax and in partnership with the United Way, Baptist helped provide two Construction Ready courses which are 20-day programs that prepared students with no or little construction experience to be job-ready. Forty-eight students completed the course, and 41 secured gainful employment. Virtual and in-person employment services such as job placements and resume services were also provided to 739 residents.

Access to Food

The USDA defines food insecurity as the limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate and safe foods or limited or uncertain ability to acquire acceptable foods in socially acceptable ways. Baptist Health attempted to address this need by working with community partners and safety net clinics (Community Health Outreach, JaxCareConnect, Muslim American Social Services, Sulzbacher Downtown, and Volunteers in Medicine).

Bridge the Gap's Garden of Eden program aimed to move the needle on conversations surrounding hunger relief, food insecurity, and the disparities within communities relating to basic living needs. Supported by the Garden of Eden Farm and partnerships with Feeding Northeast Florida and local grocery chains (Harvey's, Publix, and Winn-Dixie), Bridge the Gap provided nutritional support to Duval residents. From FY 2023-2024, the organization distributed over 21,040 lbs. of food monthly to about 3,000 people by FY 2024. Distribution included the homebound and senior-living residents participating in the twice-weekly food distribution. Additional support included Lift Jax's Debs Store which opened in 2024, ensuring that the Eastside of Jacksonville is no longer a food desert.

Parks

Baptist Health aimed to assist in the creation and improvement of safe green spaces to revitalize the community. Through multiple partners, Baptist Health can potentially promote healthy lifestyles and public safety.

Blue Zones Project Jacksonville worked to enhance the built environment by developing an environment that is supportive of routine walking, bicycling, and community engagement. One of its objectives was to enable social gathering areas to give every resident the opportunity to access places outside of their home. This would promote important social interactions with neighbors of varying ages, backgrounds, and perspectives. Also, in partnership with Blue Zones and Tobacco-Free Jacksonville, the City of Jacksonville unanimously passed a smoke-free park ordinance, prohibiting smoking in Jacksonville's parks.

Groundwork Jacksonville's Emerald Trail is a 30-mile trail and linear park system that will connect 14 disadvantaged urban neighborhoods to downtown and local waterways. Baptist Health supported the initiative by activating the Trail's LaVilla Link to engage businesses, community partners, and community members in health-making and health education activities.

Last, a critical component of Baptist Health's community partner Lift Jax was activating parks and green spaces by building best-in-class infrastructure and implementing programming at existing parks located in the heart of the Eastside, namely A. Philip Randolph Heritage Park, Buster Ford Checkerboard Park, and Flossie Brunson Park. A comprehensive parks plan was created with the City of Jacksonville, with equipment and amenities having been upgraded at A. Philip Randolph and Flossie Brunson Parks in FY 2023 and parks programming being developed in collaboration with Blue Zones Project Jacksonville.

Seniors

To continue addressing priorities from the previous 2019 CHNA, Baptist Jacksonville worked with local organizations that provided seniors with additional supports.

Meals on Wings, developed by the University of North Florida Center for Nutrition and Food Security, also addressed food insecurity by recovering food that would normally be wasted by area hospitals and repackaging the food into healthy, balanced meals. The meals were then delivered to older adults on the program's list. From FY 2022-2024, Meals on Wings provided 14,438.4 meals through Baptist Jacksonville donations and 27,134 meals through Baptist system donations to around 250 older adults of Duval County. As of FY 2024, about 55,130 meals have been provided to Duval residents since October 2018 from system donations.

Housing and Transportation

Through Blue Zones Project Jacksonville, Baptist Health assessed its ability to play a role in affecting change by reviewing resources that address healthy, affordable housing and economic disparities resulting in limited transportation options. Blue Zones' policy strategies included the following:

- Encourage the City of Jacksonville to identify and expand geographic access to fare-free or reduced-fare transit passes within target communities for under-18, low-income, or over-65 residents including establishing a baseline measurement of current ridership.
- Encourage the City of Jacksonville and relevant stakeholders to establish funding available in the Jacksonville Affordable Housing Fund.
- Coordinate with the City of Jacksonville to map potential housing development opportunities in neighborhood centers, underutilized parking lots and aging strip malls, including identifying target areas for Accessory Dwelling Units, cottage courts, townhomes, and other missing middle housing types to reflect potential opportunities when compared to current baseline.

Findhelp

Findhelp is a social care network that connects people seeking help and verified social care organizations that serve them. It thus made it easy for people to find social services in their communities, for nonprofits to coordinate their efforts, and for customers to integrate social care into the work they already do. Implementation of Findhelp occurred through the summer of 2022 as the Epic electronic health record system was being set up for a late July start. Eighty organizations received 123 referrals from May 2022 to September 2024.
